



<u>A.DEFINITION:</u> Phrasal Verbs are combinations of verbs and prepositions or adverbs. These prepositions or adverbs are sometimes called particles

V + Adv	V + Adv +Prep.	
Get away	Catch up with	
Pick up	Look down on	
Pass away	Go in for(= be interested in)	
	Get away Pick up	

Ex: The thief <u>broke into</u> the house and <u>took</u> <u>away</u> all the precious items.




Type 2:	Type 2: Separable : the object can be put either between the verb and the particle or after the particle						
Ex 1: I looked the number up in the phone book							
Or I looked up the number in the phone book							
Note: I looked it up in the phone number (RIGHT)							
I looked up it in the phone number. (WRONG)





Ex: The man is trying to throw the ball <u>at</u> the basket.

Some Examples

To point sth at sb/ sth



Eg: The soldier is pointing his gun <u>at</u> the boy.

- to leave somewhere for somewhere



Ex: I am going to leave Ho Chi Minh City <u>for</u> London.


