## II. GRAMMAR

## PHRASAL VERBS

**A.DEFINITION:** Phrasal Verbs are combinations of verbs and prepositions or adverbs. These prepositions or adverbs are sometimes called particles

V + prep.	V + Adv	V + Adv +Prep.
Look for Laugh at Break into	Get away Pick up Pass away	Catch up with Look down on Go in for( = <i>be interested in</i> )

**Ex:** The thief **broke into** the house and **took away** all the precious items.

## II GRAMMAR:

### B. TYPES

### PHRASAL VERBS (Cont.)

**Type 1:** **Inseparable** : the object always goes after the articles

**Ex:** I **ran into** an old friend yesterday

**Ex 2 :** They **are looking into** the problem

**Note :** We don't say :

*I **ran** an old friend **into** the problem (WRONG)*

## Type 2:

***Separable*** : the object can be put either between the verb and the particle or after the particle

Ex 1: I **looked** the number **up** in the phone book

Or I **looked up** the number in the phone book

Note: I **looked it up** in the phone number ( **RIGHT** )

I **looked up** it in the phone number. ( **WRONG** )

Bring up	Find out	Look up	Put off
Carry out	Give up	Make up	Put on
Turn on/off	Take up	Pick up	Show around
Fill in	Leave out	Put aside	Turn down

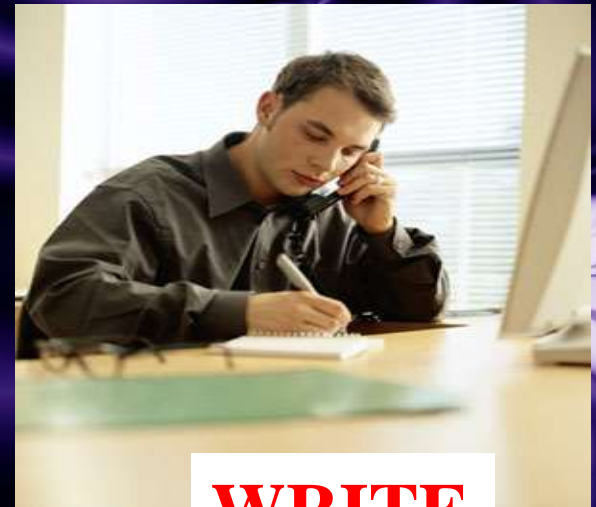

## Some common phrasal verbs

To explain sth to sb	To leave somewhere for somewhere
To laugh at sb	To ask sb for sth
To invite sb to somewhere	To look for sb/sth
To listen to sb/sth	To apply to sb/ sth
To point sth at sb/ sth	To wait for sb
To glance at sb/sth	To stare at sb/st
To speak to sb	To write sth to sb
To throw sth at sb/sth	To have a discussion about sth

## Some Examples

To explain sth to sb



Ex: The teacher is **explaining** the new lesson to her students.

# Some examples for phrasal verbs

To throw sth at sb/sth



Ex: The man is trying to **throw** the ball **at** the basket.

## Some Examples

**To point sth at sb/ sth**



**Eg: The soldier is pointing his gun at the boy.**

- to leave somewhere for somewhere



Ex: I am going **to leave** Ho Chi Minh City **for** London.
